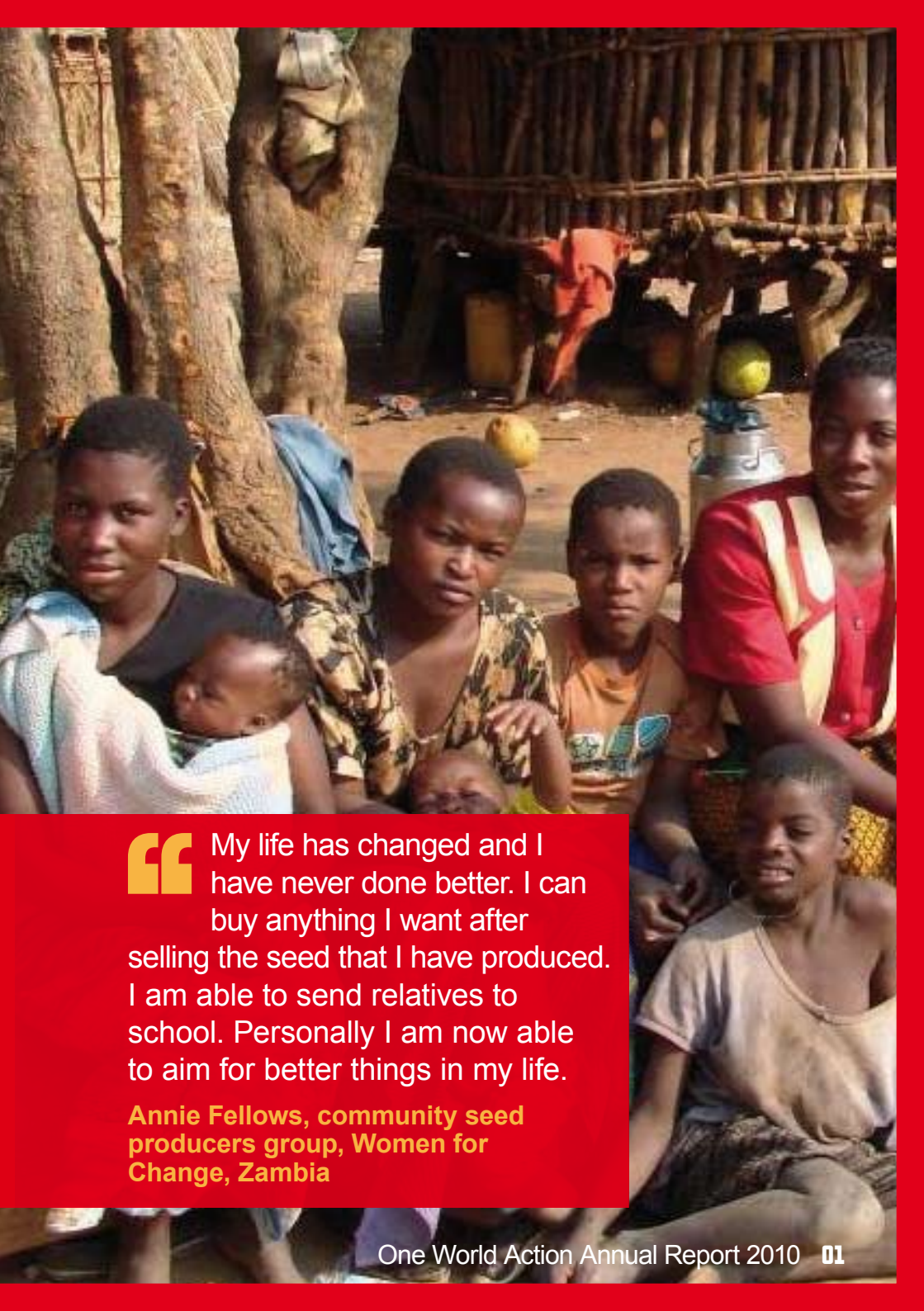
# WELCOME

# THE FAST READ 2010

## **WHO WE ARE**

We are an international development agency that focuses on democracy, governance, social inclusion and gender. We take a feminist approach to development, seeking to challenge all oppression and unjust use of power.

## **WHAT WE DO**

We work with local partners in developing countries to ensure marginalised people have a voice. Women's rights are central to all we do – just and sustainable development isn't possible if half the world is excluded.

## **HOW WE DO IT**

We provide our partners with the opportunities they want and need – lobbying, funding, networking and capacity building. We challenge unjust international policies on aid and trade and link our partners together. We enable our partners to advocate for themselves rather than advocating on their behalf.

## **WHERE WE DO IT**

As well as Africa, Asia and Latin America, we now have partners in Eastern Europe and work alongside them to advocate in the UK and Europe for better policies and international support.

## **WHY WE ARE DIFFERENT**

We don't pretend injustice and inequality aren't political issues. We tackle the root cause of poverty – lack of power – by campaigning for women's full participation. We don't have field offices or vehicles overseas and we don't impose an agenda.

# BUILDING ACCOUNTABILITY

Strong democracy needs transparent systems of accountability. Marginalised people have the right to know what their elected representatives, governments and public officials are doing in their name and with their taxes – and with the aid money that comes from donor governments. One World Action works to ensure the most marginalised and excluded people know and can claim their rights and have access to information on what their government is doing and how funds are being spent. We support our partners to advocate for fairer policies and more transparent legislation. We also advocate in the UK and EU to make sure our own political representatives develop international frameworks for aid, trade and development that make a just and equal world more likely, not less.

## **ACTION REPORT**

COMFREL – the Committee for Free and Fair Elections – enables Cambodian citizens to become involved in decision making processes. They have held hundreds of local forums that bring together citizens, elected representatives and powerful local elites. The forums have proved an effective way of increasing accountability and opening up political spaces at the local level.

Connect! is a joint KARAT and OWA advocacy initiative to ensure that aid from EU members continues to support the poorest and most marginalised people. ## **STRENGTHENING CONNECTIONS AND ACCOUNTABILITY**

Connect! is a pioneering initiative aimed at supporting organisations in New Member States (NMS) of the European Union – Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Romania, Poland and Slovakia – to influence and hold their governments to account for full implementation of EU policy on gender equality and women’s empowerment in their development programmes. Connect! builds linkages between OWA’s partners in Southern Africa and nongovernmental organisations in NMS. OWA is working closely with the KARAT Coalition in Poland to co-ordinate the work which is calling for gender-equitable and responsive aid to make the most tangible difference in the lives of the poorest young women and girls.

### **ACTION REPORT**

KARAT is a regional coalition of organisations and individuals that focuses on women’s human rights and promotes gendered economic and social justice for the Central and Eastern European and Central Asian countries. KARAT is one of the many networks and social movements we participate in so that we can link our partners around the world and strengthen our message of gender equality.

# BUILDING WOMEN'S PARTICIPATION

Women and girls often miss out on the benefits of development because of politics, tradition, culture, patriarchy and violence. We challenge women's exclusion by campaigning for women's leadership at all levels and by promoting their full political participation through our campaign: More Women More Power. We also support women's organisations in the south to mobilise the most discriminated against women to access the resources and services that are theirs' by right. Last year, this support became even more pertinent when the military coup in Honduras led to a sudden and dramatic reversal in the progress that had been made. Our support for our partner CEM-H, the Honduras Centre for Women's Studies, has only become stronger as a result.

## REFUGEE RIGHTS IN TANZANIA

For more than thirty years, Tanzania has been hosting hundreds of thousands of refugees who fled from brutal atrocities in Rwanda, Burundi and the Democratic Republic of Congo. But what was once an open-door policy has now been abandoned in favour of a commitment to a “refugee-free Tanzania”. Restrictive policies are making life in the refugee camps unbearable and have resulted in escalating levels of sexual and gender-based violence. OWA is supporting the Women’s Legal Aid Centre (WLAC) to overcome the many barriers to accessing justice faced by refugee survivors of violence. WLAC trains refugee para-legals to respond to cases of violence and provide legal advice, counselling and referral services within the camps and surrounding villages. The organisation also works to develop a human rights culture in the camps through public education campaigns. The number of women and girls bringing cases forward is steadily increasing as a result – a glimmer of hope amidst a desperate situation.

# BUILDING CITIZEN CAPACITY

Many people's organisations and social movements have the commitment, legitimacy and drive to tackle the injustice and inequality that face them and their communities.

We aim to increase our partners' capacity to advocate for themselves including training on campaigning and gender budgeting, workshops on disabled people's rights, making information available on women's rights, legal rights and participation in elections. We also address livelihood issues and provide support for income generation that enables marginalised people to become more independent – it's hard to stand up for your rights when you're spending all your time trying to get enough to eat.

## **ACTION** Disabled people's rights in Latin America

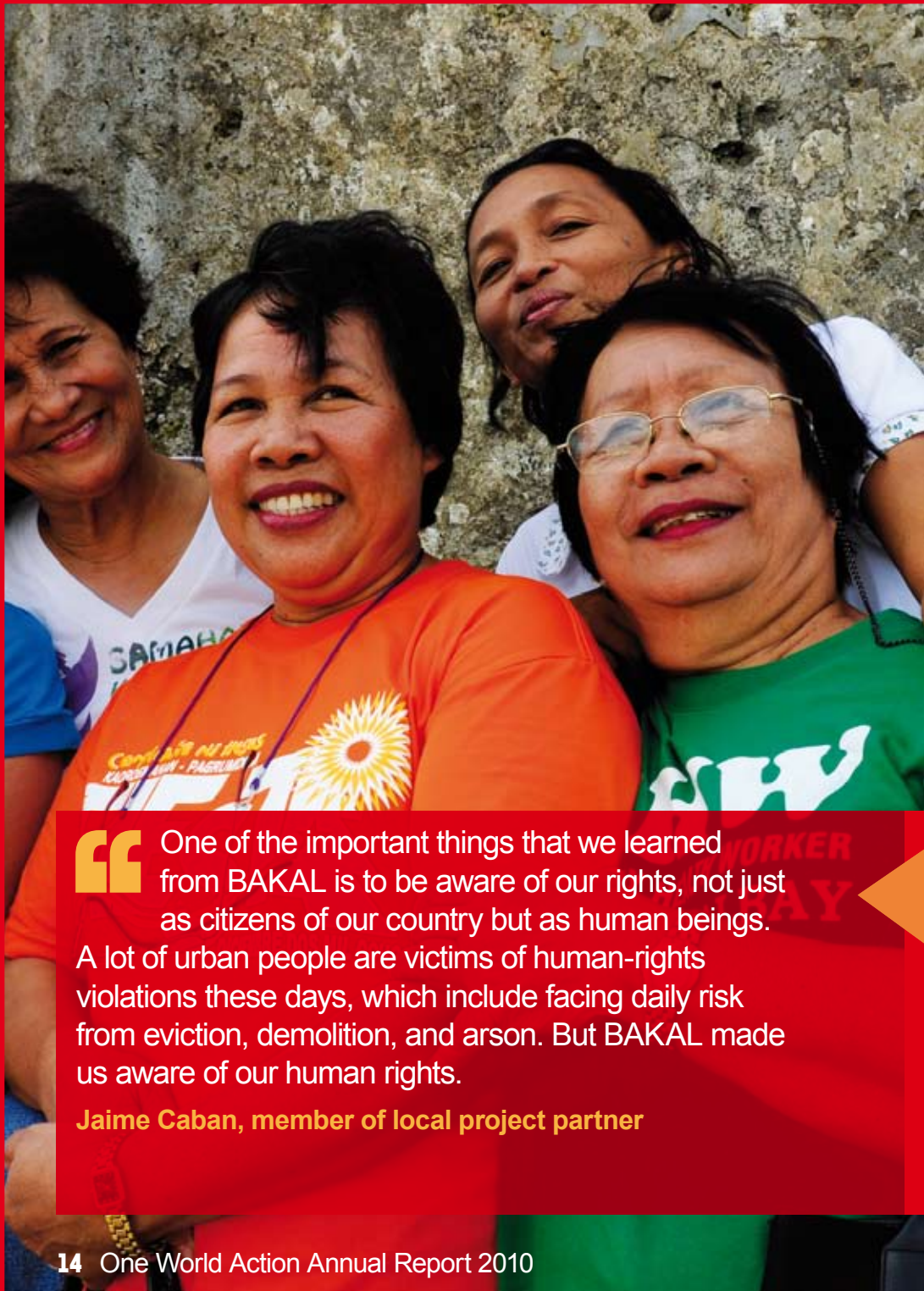
### **UPDATE**

With OWA's support, The Consortium for Disabled People's Rights in Latin America (which includes four of our local partners), gained legal status in 2009 and is increasing its membership. The Consortium's success demonstrates how the voice of one of the most excluded groups – disabled women – can be amplified and made more effective, through organisations uniting formally.



A very important thing that we have learned is that disabled women and non-disabled women are equal to men; we have the same rights and the same responsibilities. As a result of the fact that men and women attended gender-awareness trainings together, intra-family violence and violence against women in the community have substantially decreased.

## **STRENGTHENING LOCAL GOVERNANCE IN THE PHILIPPINES**

The Philippines is one of the most unequal countries in Asia – 43% of the population live on less than \$2 a day. Despite the progressive Local Government Code of 1991 which supported the involvement of local citizens in politics and decision making, corruption and powerful elites continue to control resources and keep the majority of people entrenched in poverty. The BAKAL programme established by OWA's partner, the Institute of Politics and Governance (IPG), is working to implement the Code and achieve gender equality in political leadership. IPG are working with local groups of the most marginalised sectors – Muslim women, poor farmers and informal slum dwellers in Manila. By providing training, knowledge and resources, BAKAL has enabled activists, politicians and communities to move towards a more accountable development partnership.

# LUPP RECEIVES DRIVERS OF CHANGE AWARD 2009

In November 2009, the Luanda Urban Poverty Programme (LUPP) received the prestigious Southern Africa Drivers of Change Award. OWA and our local partner Development Workshop, have been central to the LUPP since it began in 1999. As the award citation summed up, the LUPP has been successful in “driving systemic change in the way poverty reduction programmes are run in Angola, through a fresh approach that others have struggled to achieve. Benefitting over 400,000 of Luanda’s poorest, LUPP has successfully laid the foundation for poor citizens to become active in shaping their futures.”



# BUILDING SOLIDARITY

Solidarity is about linking people South and North to learn from each other and understand how we can make genuine change happen in the lives of millions of women and men who would otherwise be excluded from development. We actively participate in global networks and social movements that campaign for justice and equality, such as the Asia-Europe People's Movement, as well as UK and European networks such as Bond, Solidar and WIDE. We also act as a network node to help forge regional and international links between our partners.

## **TACKLING VIOLENCE AND DISCRIMINATION AGAINST WOMEN WORLDWIDE**

Although women make up 50% of the world's population they represent only 10% of the world's decision-makers. Since its creation 30 years ago, the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) has become known as the global bill of women's rights. Despite being ratified by 186 States, including the UK, discrimination and violence against women continue to be pervasive worldwide. In November 2009 OWA and Womenkind Worldwide organised an international conference in London to review progress – or lack of it – on CEDAW. The conference drew parallels between North and South – not always favourable ones for the UK where we still have disproportionately fewer women MPs than Afghanistan or Rwanda. Participants included Theresa May, now Minister for Women and Home Secretary, who is accountable for the UK's CEDAW commitments.



Poverty is created by people – it can be eradicated. Ultimately it is a question of political choice. We expect our leaders to be bold in the choices they make – to commit to the ambitious actions and changes needed to tackle the pervasive inequality and lack of power that keep women and men poor.

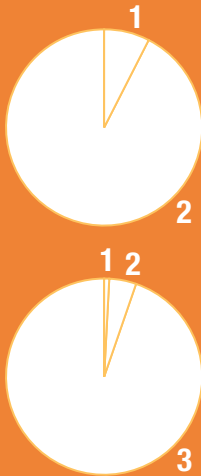

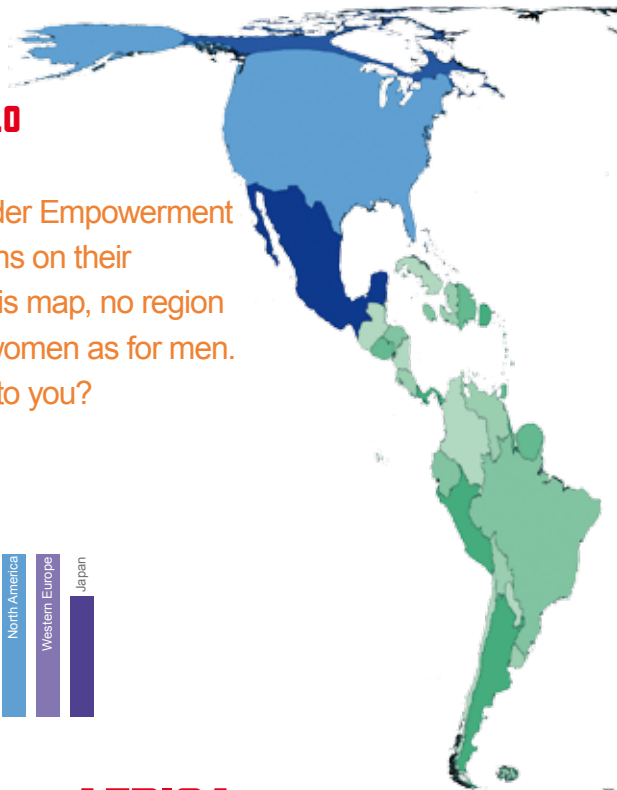

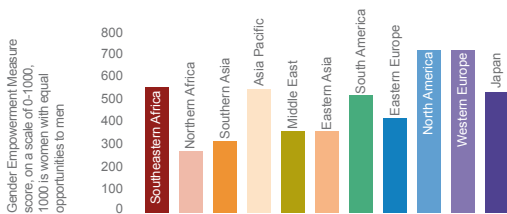

## WORLD GENDER EMPOWERMENT



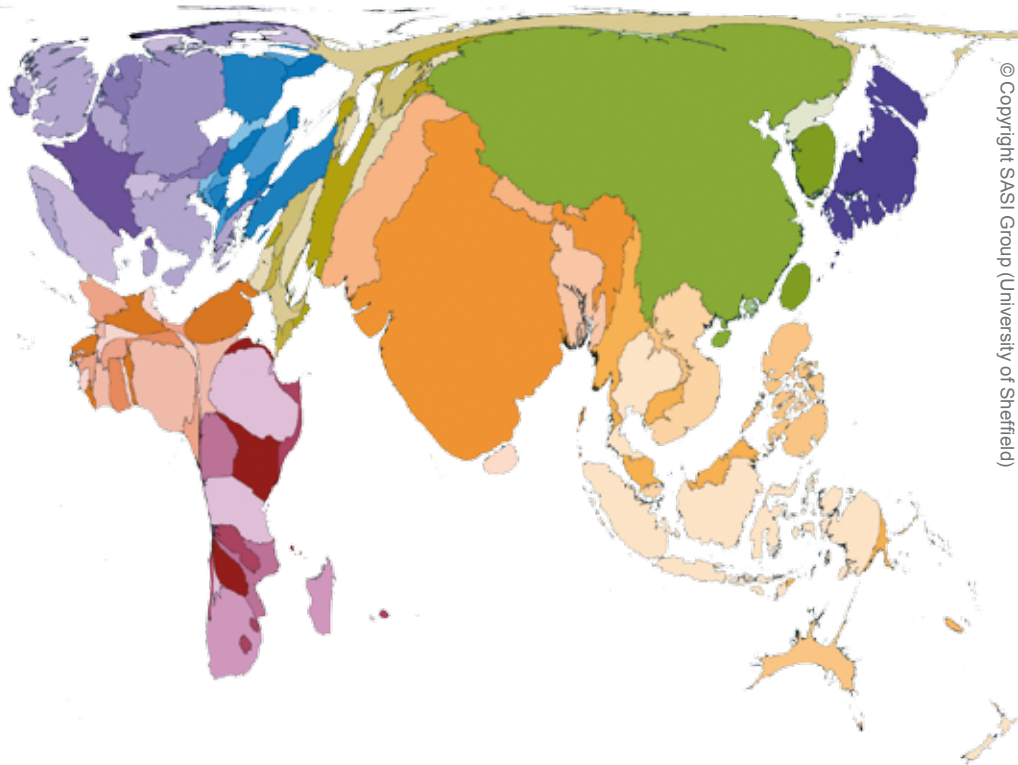

# HOW ONE WORLD ACTION WORKS
